

WE ARE VIVID

In the early 1960s, passionate community groups in Echuca and Swan Hill came together with one shared purpose – to create better opportunities and stronger supports for people with disability and their families.

In Swan Hill, this vision became the Lady Byrnes Centre. In Echuca, it was Murray Human Services. By 1999, the two organisations united under the Murray Human Services banner, and in 2018, they rebranded as We Are Vivid – now simply known as Vivid.

Today, Vivid supports more than 270 people with disability across northern Victoria. With a dedicated team of around 150 staff, services are delivered from sites in Swan Hill, Kerang, Echuca, and Kyabram.

As a registered NDIS provider, Vivid offers a wide range of supports – from day programs and supported employment, to transport, accommodation, support coordination, and assistance in both the home and community.

Over six decades, Vivid has grown into a leading regional disability service provider, with an annual turnover of more than \$13 million. Yet at its heart, the organisation remains true to the same vision that inspired its beginnings: supporting people with disability to live the life they choose, and walking alongside their families and carers every step of the way.

With a proud history and a strong commitment to the future, Vivid continues to celebrate ability, empower independence, and build inclusive communities. Our Vision:

WHAT WE DO

Vivid provides tailored care, support, and pathways for more than 250 adults with disability across Northern Victoria. Our person-centred approach ensures that each support plan is flexible, responsive, and aligned to the unique goals and aspirations of every participant. In addition to on-site and community-based services, we also offer transport assistance to help people in rural or remote areas access the supports they need.

Our services are delivered across four core streams:



Vivid Living offers a boutique range of living options and flexible support activities designed to empower people to live life their own way. Services include:

- Community access
- 1:1 flexible support
- Supported accommodation and in-home supports
- Supported holidays and overnight stays





Vivid Employment provides structured employment pathways that support individuals to achieve their personal employment goals. These pathways include:





TRANSFORMING THROUGH TECHNOLOGY



VIVID'S IT JOURNEY

In recent years, Vivid has embraced a bold and strategic approach to technology transformation, recognising its critical role in enhancing productivity, streamlining operations, and supporting our people to deliver exceptional services.

Our journey began in 2021, with a comprehensive review of our IT Strategy. This laid the foundation for a multi-year roadmap focused on modernisation, integration, and innovation.

One of our earliest initiatives was the Equipment Modernisation Project, launched in 2022, with a clear goal: by 2027, no IT equipment in use would be older than five years. Thanks to proactive planning and investment including the purchase of 30 new laptops in June 2025, we are already ahead of schedule.

We also made a strategic decision to adopt Microsoft 365 as our core suite of applications. Migration to SharePoint began in 2023, and by 2025, all users had successfully transitioned, enabling greater collaboration, data security, and operational efficiency.

A major milestone was the selection and implementation of OneCare (TechnologyOne) as our Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system.
Following extensive consultation and requirements gathering in 2023, OneCare Financials went live in February 2024, followed by Payroll in May 2025.
The next phase will introduce modules for Fixed Assets, Recruitment, Onboarding, Training, Performance Appraisals, Budgeting, and Electronic Purchase Orders, further strengthening our digital backbone

In parallel, we completed planning and testing for the Plumtree Fleet Booking System, which is set to go live in September 2025, offering a more streamlined and accessible way to manage our vehicle fleet.

Looking ahead, we are preparing for the future with a focus on Artificial Intelligence (AI). Managers are being upskilled in the potential applications of AI in administration and service delivery. We've begun using Copilot, and training opportunities are being actively embraced across the organisation.

This transformation is more than just technology, it's about empowering our people, enhancing our services, and building a resilient, future-ready organisation. Vivid's IT journey reflects our commitment to continuous improvement and innovation, ensuring we remain a valued and integral part of our community.



THRIVING WITH PURPOSE

NATE'S LEAP FROM SCHOOL TO WORK

At just 19, Nate Spiers has taken his first steps into the workforce—and he's loving every minute.

A 2024 graduate of St Joseph's College Echuca, Nate joined Vivid's School Leaver Employment Supports (SLES) program, part of the NDIS, to help him make a smooth and supported transition from school life into meaningful work.

One of Nate's favourite memories from school was managing the recycling bins giving him a chance to move around campus, greet students, and stay connected. That same enthusiasm for community and activity has carried into his new role at Woolworths Echuca West, where he collects boxes and operates the box crusher.

"It's hard to decide which I enjoy more, pushing the button on the box crusher or moving around the store chatting to teammates and customers." — Nate

WORK CREW: REAL JOBS, REAL IMPACT

At Vivid, we're proud to operate three Australian Disability Enterprises under the banner of Work Crew, located in Echuca, Kerang, and Swan Hill. These crews provide paid, meaningful employment for people with disability, combining real-world work opportunities with the tailored support they need to succeed.

Work Crew Supported Employees receive job coaching, skill development, and workplace accommodations to help build confidence, independence, and long-term employability. But it's more than just earning an income. Work Crew is about creating pathways to inclusion, dignity, and connection through purposeful work.

One of our most valued partnerships this year has been with Murray ACE, a community-focused organisation that shares our commitment to inclusion. Each week, our supported employees and their support workers have visited Murray ACE to assist with lawn and garden maintenance. What began as a practical arrangement quickly blossomed into a deeply rewarding collaboration.

Through this partnership, our crew members have not only enhanced the appearance of Murray ACE's outdoor spaces, they've also become part of a welcoming and respectful community.

Staff at Murray ACE consistently speak of the joy they feel during our visits, and the mutual appreciation is clear. These interactions foster social connection, build workplace skills, and reinforce the value of supported employment in creating inclusive environments.

Collaborations like these continue to demonstrate

For our participants, it's more than a job. It's a chance to be seen, heard, and valued. And for our partners, it's a reminder of the strength that comes from working together toward a more inclusive future.

We're proud of the impact Work Crew has had and grateful for the support of organisations like Murray ACE who help make it possible.





CREATIVITY, KINDNESS, AND COMMUNITY



WITH JOEL AWTY

Joel Awty focuses on what matters most: kindness, creativity and the little joys in life, like a good dad joke or putting your coffee cup in the sink.

Eight years ago, after finishing high school, Joel moved into supported accommodation with Vivid. The transition took patience, but today he thrives, living independently while supported by a caring community. "Vivid has made a big difference in my life," he says.

Joel's passion is art. Every Thursday, he attends Vivid's artist-in-residence program, where he creates anime characters under the guidance of artist David Barrett. His work reflects his love of fantasy, storytelling, and harmony. "I want people to see my passion and be open to the world anime offers," Joel

His art featured at Echuca's inaugural Ripple
Fest under his own animation label, Studio
Periscue. He is also developing an anime-style
short, inspired by childhood favorites like
Dragon Ball Z and Pokémon, and dreams of
one day visiting Japan to immerse himself in
the culture that inspires him.

Beyond art, Joel hopes to become a chaplain, helping young people or the elderly feel seen and connected. "My superpower is to listen and be kind," he says.

For Joel, Echuca is home, Vivid is family, and life is about purpose, creativity, and kindness. And of course, a classic dad joke:

Our Group Based Programs are one of the many enriching opportunities we provide for the people we support. These experiences empower individuals with disability to engage in activities of their choosing, build independent living skills, be active members of their community, and best of all, enjoy it all alongside friends.

We are proud to celebrate the incredible community connections we've made through our programs. These partnerships have created shared learning, joy, and a sense of belonging, not just for our clients, but for the wider community as well.

One of the year's standout partnerships was with St Joseph's College, where students and Vivid participants came together for ceramics, tennis, and wellness walks. These sessions weren't just about learning new skills, they were about breaking down barriers and building mutual respect. As one participant shared, "I didn't think I could do art like this. Now I want to teach others."

At Crossenvale Community House, our mosaic art program became a weekly ritual of joy and pride. Participants created stunning pieces that have been publicly displayed, a testament to their talent and the power of community collaboration. ANNUAL REPORT 24/25

We also teamed up with Echuca TAFE, where pamper sessions with trainee hairdressers and makeup artists brought smiles, confidence, and a sense of celebration.

Beyond the partnerships, our internal programs flourished. From cooking and music to sports and advocacy training, every activity was designed to foster independence, confidence, and joy. The All Abilities Bowling League became a weekly favourite, with cheers echoing across the lanes and friendships growing stronger with every game.

This year, we didn't just run programs, we built bridges. We saw participants step into leadership roles, advocate for themselves, and take pride in their achievements. We saw communities open their arms wider. And we saw the ripple effect of inclusion, how one shared moment can spark a

FLEXIBLE SUPPORTS AND ACCESS ALL AREAS ACTIVITIES

This year has been filled with joy, adventure, and meaningful connections, as our Flexible Supports and Access All Areas programs empowered participants to explore new experiences, build friendships, and make choices that reflect what matters most to them.

Through our everyday Flexible Supports, we've walked alongside participants as they pursued their goals and embraced life's simple pleasures. For some, that meant choosing to build healthy routines at the gym each week. For others, it was about receiving support at home with daily living needs, ensuring comfort, dignity, and independence. And sometimes, it was about saying "yes" to something special, like a weekend away fishing, where one participant shared, "It felt so good to just get away for a night, I came back smiling."

Our Access All Areas program has been a celebration of choice and connection, offering a wide range of outings that sparked joy and created lasting memories. From the excitement of Bendicon, the Unbound Art Exhibition, the Melbourne Show, and Super Nova Comicon where one participant dressed as their favourite superhero and said, "People wanted photos with me, I felt like a star!" to the thrill of live music and sporting events, every experience was chosen by participants and shared with friends.

Whether it was cheering at the Big Bash, dancing at AbilityFest, or enjoying the roar of Monster Trucks, participants embraced the chance to connect socially and express themselves. One participant called the AFL clash between Richmond and West Coast "the best day of the year," while another said after AbilityFest, "I never thought I'd go to a festival, but now I can't wait for the next one."

There were also quieter, heartfelt moments like wandering through the golden fields at the Sunflowers of Timmering, where one participant said, "I never wanted to leave, it was so beautiful." Another proudly joined All Abilities Cricket for the first time, beaming, "I didn't know I could play, but I hit the ball and everyone cheered for me!"

Alongside these highlights, our regular programs continue to foster social connectedness and community spirit. The Ky Social Group's monthly catch-ups at Hurley's are full of friendly chatter, Pizza and Pool nights are a twice-monthly favourite, and Barefoot Bowls, Mini Golf, and Ten Pin Bowling remain great ways to unwind and connect. As one participant shared, "I look forward to these nights all month, it's my time with friends."

Every activity, whether big or small, reflects the power of choice, the joy of connection, and the value of being supported to live life your way.

CHRIS' JOURNEY BACK TO VIVID

A STORY OF RESILIENCE, ADVOCACY AND THE POWEI OF SUPPORT COORDINATION

Chris has been a cherished member of the Vivid community for over 28 years. His connection is more than just regular attendance, it's a vital part of his identity, his routine, and his sense of belonging.

In March 2025, Chris was diagnosed with cancer. The treatment journey was physically and emotionally demanding, and it meant he could no longer attend during this time. While Chris remained hopeful about returning, his health and mobility needs changed significantly as a result of his treatment.

By August 2025, Chris had completed his treatment and was eager to return to the community he loved. However, his new mobility requirements meant he couldn't safely do so without the right equipment and environmental supports in place. This is where Support Coordination played a pivotal role.

As Chris Support Coordinator, we worked closely with Vivid, allied health professionals, Yooralla, and Country Care Echuca to identify the barriers to his return and develop a tailored plan to overcome them.

Through advocacy, collaboration, and a deep understanding of Chris' goals and preferences, we were able to secure the necessary equipment and ensure his transition back to Vivid was safe, supported, and empowering.

Support Coordination is more than just connecting people to services, it's about understanding each person's unique goals, advocating for their needs, and coordinating the right mix of supports to help them live with choice and control. In Chris' case, it meant listening to what mattered most to him - returning to Vivid, and making that happen through a coordinated, person-centred approach.

Chris' return was not only a testament to his resilience, but also to the strength of a support system that truly works together. Seeing him back at Vivid, surrounded by familiar faces and routines, has been a joyful and emotional moment for all involved.

His story is a powerful reminder of the impact Support Coordination can have, not just in navigating complex systems, but in championing people's rights, enabling independence, and helping them live the life they choose.





RESIDENTIAL SERVICES SPOTLIGHT



TARYN'S JOURNEY WITH VIVID'S SUPPORTED INDEPENDENT LIVING

At Vivid, our Supported Independent Living (SIL) services are designed to empower individuals to live with confidence, autonomy, and purpose. For Taryn Matthews-Sinclair, her journey is a beautiful reflection of what's possible when the right support meets personal determination.

A Home That Builds Confidence

Taryn lives in Vivid's newest SIL home in Echuca. A warm, structured environment where Taryn is supported to make her own choices and grow her independence. Taryn is actively involved in household routines, helping prepare lunches for her day program and contributing to the weekly meal plan. Each resident has a night to cook, and Taryn enjoys selecting recipes from the house cookbook and preparing meals for her housemates. These moments have helped her build confidence in the kitchen and pride in her contributions.

Living Life Her Way

Social connection is a key part of Taryn's life.

Monthly catch-ups with other Vivid homes give her
the chance to share meals and stories, and birthdays
are celebrated with outings that she looks forward
to. She's also part of Vivid's Life Skills Group
Program, where she's learning to manage money and
prepare food, skills that are helping her feel more
capable and independent.

Taryn is encouraged to make her own choices such as joining group activities like barefoot bowls and mini golf, enjoying leisurely outings, using the home gym or going on bike rides with support staff. These experiences help Taryn build friendships and explore her interests.

Specialist Support That Makes a Difference
Vivid's SIL services include access to allied health
professionals. Taryn's communication has improved
thanks to regular speech therapy, and her
physiotherapy routine is supported by visual aids
and gentle equipment like elastic bands and light
weights.

Taryn's Story: A Testament to Growth
Taryn's journey is one of quiet strength and steady
progress. She's learning, growing, and becoming
more independent every day. As Support
Coordinator Tammy Newport shared:

"Vivid has gone above and beyond in catering to Taryn's personal and mental health needs, not just meeting them but truly exceeding expectations."

Taryn's story is a powerful reminder of what's possible when individuals are supported to live life on their own terms.

VIVID CREATIVES SHINE AT CAMPASPE SHIRE'S RIPPLE FEST In May, five talented creatives f



In May, five talented creatives from Vivid brought colour, imagination, and connection to Campaspe Shire Council's inaugural Ripple Fest, a multi-arts celebration of culture and community held in Echuca and Rochester.

Ripple Fest was an immersive program of creative workshops, arts and craft activities, dance, performance, music, activations, and storytelling. It provided a vibrant platform for local artists to showcase their work and engage with the community in new and inspiring ways.

Following an open call for expressions of interest,
Joel Awty, Geraldine Gallivan, Emmett Stephens,
Amelia Dean, and Michelle McCaffrey were selected
to join the festival's Pump House Artists collective.
With the support of their Vivid team, they spent
several weeks creating original artworks for display,
working alongside other local artists at the Pump
House, the former Echuca Visitor Information Centre.

For Joel, the opportunity was a long-awaited dream come true. He collaborated with artist David Barrett to develop a host of animated fantasy characters he had been imagining since the age of 15. "I have been looking at doing this since I was 15. It's been a long time coming," Joel said. "I loved producing it with David."

ABOUT THE PUMP HOUSE ARTISTS COLLECTIVE

The Pump House Artists collective was the creative hub of Ripple Fest, based in the former Echuca Visitor Information Centre. It hosted local artists-in-residence, workshops, and collaborative projects — providing a vibrant, supportive space for emerging and established artists to share their craft with the community.

Michelle expressed how much she enjoyed painting at the gallery with friends and the pride she felt seeing her artwork on display. Amelia shared her excitement at attending the VIP event and viewing her work in a professional exhibition setting.

The festival was also a moment of success for Geraldine, whose bird-inspired piece, influenced by the birds outside her home, was purchased by a member of the public during the VIP launch evening.

Ripple Fest offered much more than an exhibition space; it provided an opportunity for the Vivid artists to share their talents, connect with the broader community, and experience public recognition for their creative achievements.

"We are committed to creating a community where people of all abilities thrive." Ripple Fest demonstrated this commitment in action, showcasing the value of inclusive arts and the power of community events to bring people together.

ADVOCACY IN ACTION



BESPOKE EMERGENCY BAGS EMPOWERING PEOPLE WITH DISABILITY

We are excited to commence a new collaboration between Vivid, Community Living & Respite Services (CLRS), and the Loddon Mallee Public Health Unit (LMPHU) to ensure people with disability across our region will have tailored support and information in times of emergency.

The co-designed project was initiated by LMPHU in recognition of the impacts of climate change and health emergencies on priority population groups, particularly people with disability.

Drawing on lessons learned from the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and the widespread floods of 2023, the collaboration has resulted in a co-designed emergency response bag.


Participants from both CLRS and Vivid took part in focus group sessions, contributing their experiences and ideas to help shape the project. This feedback has directly shaped the design of the bags, making them practical, accessible, and relevant. One simple but powerful change resulting from these conversations was the colour of the proposed 'emergency bag'. Members suggested that a brighter, more visible colour than black would make the bags easier to identify in an emergency. The new bags will now be produced in green, chosen because, as one member put it, "green means go!"

The bags will contain vital information and key resources such as emergency service numbers printed on a fridge magnet for easy access to ensure people with additional needs are better supported and prepared when emergencies arise.

Vivid Participant Josh Cheep, who took part in the process, said he was proud to be involved: "It gave me lots of really good information. More should be done like this. It was interesting."

One of the most rewarding aspects of the project has been the genuine collaboration it fostered between members. Participants expressed how much they valued being part of the design process. Creating a forum where people are supported and empowered to have their voices heard and to see their ideas incorporated into something that directly benefits their community, is both essential and central to our purpose: upholding and supporting the rights of all people.

The collaborative effort behind the emergency bags is a source of pride for everyone involved, with the project set to make a meaningful difference once the bags are in use later this year. It demonstrates what can be achieved when people come together with a shared purpose, to keep everyone in the community safe, supported, and included.











Sometimes the most powerful connections are made with a paintbrush in hand.

Over ten weeks, children from Shine Bright
Echuca South Kindergarten and participants from
Vivid came together to co-create something
extraordinary, a tactile mural designed to
celebrate individuality, creativity, and community.
Guided by a professional art instructor, the group
experimented with colour, texture, and pattern to
ensure the mural could be enjoyed by people of
all abilities.

The result was more than just a striking artwork. It was a joyful process of discovery, laughter, and shared achievement. More than 80 participants contributed their ideas and brushstrokes, each leaving their own unique mark on the collective design. Flexible scheduling ensured everyone could take part, while specially purchased equipment, like accessible easels, made the experience inclusive from the very beginning.

When the mural was formally unveiled, families, carers, staff, and community members gathered to celebrate the creativity and collaboration that brought the project to life. Today, the artwork has a permanent home at Shine Bright, where it continues to inspire children and families while

The impact of Shining Bright at Vivid stretched far beyond the paint on the wall. Participants built confidence, social skills, and friendships. They learned to problem-solve, work as a team, and express themselves in new ways.
